A Word of Welcome from the Executive Director of TrustAfrica

"The world is on fire." "We are living in catastrophic times." "The world is at a tipping point."

That these kinds of phrases have become common in daily conversation should not be surprising to anyone, given the multiple crises that are unfolding across different regions of the world. Nowhere are the crises felt more than in Africa. Floods, fires, droughts, pandemics, wars and other kinds of calamities can all be found on the continent. Deep and widespread poverty, huge loss of resources through illicit financial flows, economic and social crises, governance crises and violence (including the military coups and terrorism) are also still a reality for many people. In the face of such profound and complex crises, the preservation and enhancement of the sense making capacities of the continent, and our capacity to co-frame the narratives about Africa become critical, especially as our knowledge generation institutions are themselves under threat.

The good news is - from time immemorial to now - the people of this world have and will never stop deploying their intellect, talents and resources to overcome all the challenges that they are faced with in building a better world for themselves. This is what transformative philanthropy is also about. It is about what we see beyond the crises, what new horizons can humanity create for our world and how can we reimagine and proceed with the creation of a new and brighter future for Africa. These are some of the many questions that Africa's civil society organisations, social movements, universities, think tanks, policy makers and development practitioners are working to answer. There are also the very issues that African philanthropy is grappling with.

As was noted at a recent forum on sustainability, "to be living in times of crises certainly suggests that we are living on the edge and about to fall. Yet we are also at the edge, looking out to a beyond, with new horizons calling us to go beyond ourselves".

African women and youth have organized themselves to respond to the changes that are facing our societies and working to bring about changes that make life on the continent more meaningful. African philanthropy, as a sector and a community, is also growing by leaps and bounds. The many great initiatives that have been launched over the past year alone include some that clearly illustrate growing determination to move the sector to much higher levels of organizations and performance: *Reimagining pan African and Feminist Philanthropies*, and an *African Social Movements Fund*. These two initiatives

involve large numbers of Africans and friends of Africa working with global philanthropies, all of whom have a vision of improving the resourcing capacity of institutions and social movements, and the relationships both have with the global philanthropic community. They are also interrogating the dominant narratives about African philanthropy.

The choice of the theme of this edition of the African Philanthropy Conference was therefore not fortuitous. When the world is at the edge of a precipice, transformative philanthropy must pause and take a hard look at itself to be able to trigger, accompany and support movements and initiatives that can enable us to go beyond ourselves, and create a new civilization and new futures for our continent, and our planet.

This Conference has become an important annual gathering that we hope all philanthropies seeking to work with Africa will henceforth reserve a space for in their calendars. The conversations about shifting power, localization, or decolonizing philanthropy that are happening in both the Global North and the Global South need to be connected. We therefore welcome the presence of a growing number of our strategic partners from North America, Latin America, Asia and Europe.

Like last year, this year's Conference is preceded by an academic conference on the same theme as that of the main conference. Ultimately, the strength of the African philanthropic community cannot grow in the absence of strong scientific and intellectual foundations. The academic conference is hosted at the iconic *Museum of Black Civilizations* in Dakar, which is a demonstration of the importance of grounding our efforts to create new futures for Africa in our history and cultures.

The Conference also provides us with an opportunity to celebrate our successes and our heroes. For the third time, the winner of the *Lifetime Achievement in African Philanthropy* award will be announced and honored. The first two laureates, Akwasi Aidoo and Graça Machel, are luminaries. With an independent Award Committee undertaking the selection, we look forward to honoring another great luminary at this conference.

In addition, there will also be presentations of new initiatives, reports and publications as well as energetic artistic performances that represent the rich diversity of the continents creative sector.

On behalf of the board and staff of TrustAfrica, and of all the members of the organizing the African Philanthropy Conference, I say *bienvenue!* A very warm welcome to the 4th African Philanthropy Conference, the 2nd African Philanthropy Academic Conference, and

to Senegal, *le pays de la Teranga* (the land of hospitality). Message from Director of Secretariat

This year's version of the Annual African Philanthropy Conference takes place in Senegal under the timely theme of 'Philanthropy at an Inflection Point'. This is apt given the challenges facing the world in general and those confronting philanthropy in particular. The Annual African Philanthropy Conference is a platform and an opportunity for the sector to take stock, reflect and devise solutions to global and local problems. It is a gathering that seeks to work collectively, collaboratively and effectively in channeling resources adequately and efficiently to vexing societal and developmental challenges.

Since 2019, the Centre on African Philanthropy and Social Investment has managed to hold this prestigious event in collaboration with leading African institutions that include African Philanthropy Forum, Africa Philanthropy Network, East Africa Philanthropy Network, Harvard Centre for African Studies, Higher-Life Foundation, Southern Africa Trust and TrustAfrica. This year is the first time that the event is hosted by another partner outside South Africa. We are very excited about this collaborative spirit and the opportunity to rotate the event and discussions among our partners and in different locations. This allows up to ground our discussions and solutions on real life existential realities.

As we gather in Senegal, we have to respond to the several questions that require answers for Senegalese citizens and West African residents. Senegal has been witnessing political upheavals over the last months. What role should philanthropy play in facilitating an amicable resolution of the political question of leadership and governance? More importantly, political questions arise at times due to challenges of economic development and the overall high levels of inequality and poverty that characterize most of African countries. Likewise political challenges contribute immensely to economic stagnation and associated problems. For this reason, the previous versions of the Conference have addressed several dimensions of the role that African philanthropy ought to play in the development of the continent.

The first conference hosted in 2019 set the agenda and got the sector to appreciate the philanthropic landscape in Africa, understand its role and called for a coordinated approach. It is important to mention that the first Conference was held at a time when no one expected that in less than a year later, the world would be plunged into a global crisis. Nevertheless, the seed had been planted and even though in 2020 due to the COVID 19 pandemic, we were unable to hold the Conference, we came back strong in 2021 and hosted a major event online that focused on the response of philanthropy to the

pandemic. It was impressive to see the number of responses and initiatives that different types of philanthropy had designed in response to the pandemic. It is safe to say philanthropy rose to the occasion and kept societies together while governments and the private sector pushed on with mechanisms to find lasting solutions to the problem. The Conference benefited also from the participation of the African Centres for Disease Control (CDC) and Prevention. The then Head of the Africa CDC gave a keynote address at the height of COVID 19 that highlighted the plight of Africans in comparison to those in the global North especially when it came to accessing vaccines. In addition, the several collaborations between the CDC and philanthropic organisations were highlighted. Sadly at the time it appeared that very few local philanthropies collaborated with the Africa CDC. However, a lot was happening at community and country levels.

The 2021 Conference began addressing the question of systems change in philanthropy. This became the theme for the 2022 Conference that took place in Johannesburg. The world changed drastically in 2020 due to COVID 19 but these changes were already underway even before the pandemic. Issues such as climate change, high levels of inequality, and environmental justice among others were already indicating the need for the system to change. It is no doubt therefore that in the last few years there has been so much dedicated discussion on systems change broadly but also in philanthropy. Yet as we meet in 2023 in Sally, Senegal, philanthropy seems to be at an inflection point. What is next for African Philanthropy today? What role should it play? What are the key nodal points and levers to pull to effectively respond to this conundrum? The five days will tackle this question. We will start with an academic and research-intensive event that will lay the foundation for the practitioners to reflect on daily experiences, practices, policies and encounters with people in philanthropy. The academic event will be the second since the introduction of the Conference.

CAPSI is very excited that jointly with our partners, we are once again presenting Academic Conference and Annual Philanthropy Conference to the world, with the hope of building bridges across regions, geographies, sectors, practices and people.

On behalf of the Conference partners, I want to thank everyone who has worked behind the scenes and directly with the planning committee to make this a reality. I want to thank the participants for once again attending this annual event. It means you find some value in it, and we would love to collaborate with you in the next version of the Conference that will take place in 2024. There are several groups that helped curate sessions this year, to you I say thank you. My hope is that we can have more sessions curated by different groups next year.

Equally important is our desire to celebrate luminaries and legendary figures in African philanthropy. I want to thank the Independent Awards Committee that was established this year to manage the Lifetime Achievement Award for accepting to manage this process on behalf of the Conference partners. The Committee has its own guidelines and has its chairperson who will steer this work for the next versions of the conference. Let us celebrate those among us who have made transformative contributions to the field. Do send us your nomination for consideration for the next year's Award.

The History and Objectives of the Conference

The African Philanthropy Conference is an annual gathering of the continent's philanthropic institutions and stakeholders. It is a platform for sharing experiences, collective reflection and development of philanthropic and social investment practices of the continent's people.

The Conference also provides an opportunity for partners to strengthen networks and support research to accelerate the understanding of the complexities in practices that aid the maturity of the field of African philanthropy and social investment.

Since its inception, the Conference has provided an opportunity for academics, practitioners, philanthropic leaders, donors, researchers, think tanks and government officials to reflect on the issues that are confronting the ecosystem.



The 1st African Philanthropy Conference was held in 2019 under the theme "The State of Philanthropy in Africa: Setting the Agenda" at Wits Business School in South Africa, with a keynote address from Frank Kilbourn.

The 2nd African Philanthropy Conference was hosted virtually in 2021 under the theme "The Role of African Philanthropy in Surviving COVID-19" with keynote addresses from Tsitsi Masiyiwa, Everjoice Win and Dr. John Nkengasong.

The 3rd African Philanthropy Conference was a hybrid gathering hosted in 2022 under the theme "Systems Change and The New Normal in African Philanthropy". That year, the inaugural African Philanthropy Academic Conference was hosted as a platform to engage on research related to philanthropy and social investment.

The 2023 Edition of the Conference

The African Philanthropy Conference is an annual gathering of the continent's philanthropic institutions and stakeholders. It is a platform for sharing experiences, collective reflection and development of philanthropic and social investment practices of the continent's people. The Conference also provides an opportunity for partners to strengthen networks and support research to accelerate the understanding of the complexities in practices that aid the maturity of the field of African philanthropy Academic Conference will be curated under the theme of "African Philanthropy at an Inflection **Point**", during which attendees will engage within the themes four dimensions; **People**, **Power, Policy** and **Practices**.

The specific objectives of this year's Conferences inform the themes, subthemes, programme and report. These objectives are:

- Exchanging knowledge about various models and approaches to African philanthropy.
- Defining the narratives, spaces and roles that the philanthropic sector fulfils in academia, civil society and corporate sectors.
- Creating an environment where participants can engage on the challenges that the philanthropic and social investment sector will face in the foreseeable future, and cocreate solutions for these.
- Developing strategies, systems or platforms that support the collective and sustainable development of the philanthropic and social investment sector on the continent.

The African Philanthropy Lifetime Achievement Award

There are many individuals and institutions that have been pivotal in the emergence and growth of African philanthropy over the last several decades. More often their contributions go unnoticed. The **African Philanthropy Lifetime Achievement Award** was initiated in 2021 to recognise and celebrate these individuals while they are still alive. The Award is given to an individual who has contributed immensely to the growth, practice, trajectory and meaning of African philanthropy for the last twenty and plus years. The Award also recognizes an individual who has contributed to mentoring leaders and practitioners in the philanthropy sector through various interventions and mechanisms. These include the provision of guidance, linkages with opportunities to improve oneself

and their institutions, giving of their time, resources and networks as well preparing young leaders for succession.

The Award identifies an individual who has also contributed to knowledge building of the African philanthropy sector in an academic understanding in other non-academic ways that include storytelling, building of processes, policies and systems in the practice of philanthropy, writing and reflections conducted in various ways that provide data for the sector.

The 2021 recipient is Human Rights and Peace Advocate, **Akwasi Aidoo** and the 2022 recipient is Elder and Humanitarian, **Hon. Graça Machel**. For the 2023 Award, a Committee has been established to solicit nominations and select a candidate.

Weaving creative arts with African Philanthropy

This year's conference welcomes artists whose unique contributions will bring vibrancy to the proceedings. Attendees will also be treated to a traditional Lebou dance known as Ndawrabine, which is unique to Saly's Lebou community.

Baaba Maal is an icon in Senegalese music who has made remarkable contributions to the upliftment of communities across Africa. Through his dynamic artistry and commitment to social change, he has become a beacon of hope and inspiration.

Berita has prepared an acoustic performance that is reserved for special occasions, such as these African Philanthropy Lifetime Achievement Awards. You will enjoy her fusion of Afro Jazz and Contemporary Afro Soul that has won her fans across the continent.

Aita Senghor is the voice of a generation of Senegalese youth who are ready to build their future through service. She brings provoking lyrics and resounding harmonies that offer a refreshing alternative in West African music.

Killa Ace will bring his contagious energy and sounds which aptly reflect the impact that all the awardees have brought to the communities they have served. He has used his voice and writing to advocate for human rights, justice and democratic change in his home country of The Gambia.

Attendees can connect with younger attendees who serve as advisors to adult conference participants and offer an alternative perspective to national and regional matters, leaning on their lived experience, socio-geo context and areas of interest.

This Youth Corner will provide valuable insights, practical knowledge, and real-world experiences to inspire and equip the next generation of leaders while creating a meaningful and inclusive experience for all attendees.

Defining the Theme

In economics, an inflection point can be considered as a dramatic, drastic, and systemic event leading to synchronised economic decline. Typically, a real-life inflection point requires ingenuity and innovative thinking to cope, transform, or respond. The diverse responses to the global and regional crises, for example the COVID-19 pandemic illustrated several inflection points with real and long-lasting impacts on society. Considering the strides that philanthropy has made in providing and enabling solutions to crises, the sector is at an inflection point with a real task to respond, cope and shape or influence the future.

Philanthropy at an inflection point can also refer to the sector's potential to shape what is next-an ecosystem that needs to respond to the changing world, and a sector forging new frontiers in the quest to make the world a better place for all. While each trigger for an inflection point may be different, the need for change is universal and inevitable. This has seen philanthropy undergo a transformation and pivot in a manner that can be detrimental to the established order of the ecosystem.

In Africa, these shifts coupled with the myriad of other issues has led to African philanthropy to grapple with developments such as localisation, developing a south-south approach, and harnessing the local capacity for resource mobilisation. This requires the sector to be strategic, agile, and innovative. While the events following the outbreak of the pandemic witnessed unprecedented responses by African philanthropy, they also created legacy issues that need firm and intentional attention.

The Conferences will seek to answer the question: What would the world look like if philanthropy took on bigger issues, influenced large systems and systems change, and cultural narratives like capitalism, equity, democracy, and systemic racism?

People is experiencing significant inflection points, with a growing recognition of the importance of diversity and inclusion including the ways in which philanthropic actors are engaging a wider range of actors to drive change in their communities; the emergence of new actors such as impact investors, social entrepreneurs, corporate social responsibility programmes, sports personalities and artists, and a shift towards local ownership and knowledge.

Emerging Actors focuses on the emergence of new actors in philanthropy in Africa, including impact investors, social entrepreneurs, corporate social responsibility programmes, sports personalities, artists, diaspora and High Net-worth Individuals and how these bring new resources and approaches to philanthropy in the continent.

Pan-African and Feminist Philanthropies focuses on the important role of feminism in the history of philanthropy in Africa as well as its achievements, including its unique perspectives and experiences, and the ways in which feminism is driving change in their communities.

Youth and the Next Generation of Philanthropy looks at the involvement of young people in philanthropic initiatives widely witnessed through diverse avenues, their experiences and how the philanthropic horizons impact their own growth and what they seek to accomplish.

Power relates to the distribution and exercise of power within the sector, including the role of external actors like international donors, governments, and civil society organisations. An inflection point in this dimension is the growing emphasis on localisation and community ownership in philanthropy, challenging traditional power dynamics within the sector.

Power Dynamics and Local Ownership examines the balance of power between donors and beneficiaries of philanthropy in Africa, and the ways in which this power dynamic is shifting with the rise of community philanthropy and other forms of locally driven giving. The sub-theme also explores the importance of local ownership and participation in practice, including the potential for greater community involvement in programme design, implementation, and evaluation, the emergence of Community Philanthropy and the role of local organisations in driving change and impact.

Philanthropy and Systems Change explores the special feature of growing aspiration in philanthropy to achieve system change. It will study the emergence of new forms of philanthropic governance and accountability mechanisms, including the rise of participatory grant-making and other forms of more democratic decision-making. It will also explore the potential for collaboration and partnerships between philanthropic organisations and other actors, including governments and civil society, to drive policy and regulatory reforms to support effective programme design, implementation, and evaluation, to support the growth and sustainability of the philanthropic sector.

Philanthropy, International Cooperation and Finance for Development examines the potential place, roles and perspectives for cooperation between African Philanthropies and International initiatives on the international philanthropic landscape as stakeholders.

Practice encompasses the narratives of what currently define African philanthropies. An inflection point in this dimension is the shift in strategies, methods, and tools used by philanthropic organisations to achieve their goals towards more participatory and collaborative forms of philanthropy. Collaborative and participatory approaches to philanthropy empower local communities to drive change and can lead to more sustainable and impactful outcomes.

Innovative Technology for Resource Mobilisation focuses on the potential for innovation and technology to drive change and impact in philanthropy in Africa, including the use of digital technologies to reach new audiences and improve the effectiveness of philanthropic interventions. It focuses on the strategies and approaches to mobilise resources using technology including crowdfunding platforms and other innovative funding mechanisms.

Faith-based Philanthropy, Traditional Philanthropy and Emerging Models of Vertical Philanthropy will explore the evolution of traditional horizontal and faith-based practice, in an ecosystem dominated by the institutionalization of vertical philanthropy in Africa as well as the potential of combining both sides. It will also explore the impact of these types of practices in promoting local development.

Community Philanthropy will explore the strength of community practices in the philanthropic sector and the need for harnessing its potential to decolonize the source of funding.

Policy refers to the regulatory and institutional frameworks that shape the sector, including laws, regulations, and governance structures. An inflection point in this dimension is the increasing recognition of the importance of transparency and accountability in philanthropy. Philanthropic organisations are increasingly expected to be transparent about their activities and impact, and to be accountable to their stakeholders.

Regulatory Frameworks looks at the role of regulatory frameworks in shaping the philanthropic sector in Africa, including the potential for more enabling legal and policy environments to support the growth and sustainability of organisations. It will also focus on the role of governments in shaping philanthropic activity and the ways in which regulations can either support or hinder philanthropic efforts.

Exploring New Financing Models examines the role of financing models in shaping the philanthropic sector in Africa, including the potential for innovative financing models to increase the availability of resources for philanthropic organisations and support their sustainability.

Governance and Leadership focuses on the role of governance and leadership in shaping the philanthropic sector, including the potential for more effective governance structures and leadership practices to support the growth and impact of philanthropic organisations. This sub-theme will also explore the importance of transparency and accountability in the philanthropic sector, including the potential for greater transparency and accountability to build trust and legitimacy with key stakeholders such as donors, beneficiaries, and the public.
