#### **About site visits**

The Conference has welcomed an increasing diversity of delegates with each edition and has been hosted in different cities each year. The site visits to key point locations in the city are offered to delegates to learn more about the story of the host city and the communities which contribute to its development. This year is no different as we guide delegates to visit initiatives which operate in the city of Cairo.

#### **Site 1: Tawasol for Developing Istabl Antar**

Tawasol for Developing Istabl Antar is a nonprofit organization dedicated to empowering low-income communities in informal settlements. The organization employs a holistic approach to community development, integrating education, vocational training, health services, and the performing arts. Tawasol operates a community school that offers free, quality education to children who have dropped out or never attended school, providing them with elementary certificates recognized by the Ministry of Education. The school is equipped with facilities including a playground, computer lab, library, art room, and a 150-seat theater.

### Site 2: Megawra – Built Environment Collective

Megawra – Built Environment Collective (BEC) is an initiative that merges architectural practice with community-centered urban development. Formed through a partner- ship between the architectural office Megawra and the nonprofit Built Environment Collective, the organization focuses on leveraging cultural heritage as a catalyst for sustainable development.

Operating primarily in Historic Cairo's al-Khalifa district, Megawra-BEC leads the Athar Lina initiative, which integrates heritage conservation with community engagement. Their work encompasses restoring historic sites, providing heritage education, and promoting socioeconomic empowerment through heritage industries and urban regeneration linked to environmental sustainability.

### **Pyramids and Bazaar**

The Great Pyramids of Giza are ancient Egyptian structures built as tombs for pharaohs. The Bazaar, often Khan el-Khalili, is a historic marketplace in Cairo known for its shops selling souvenirs, spices, and handicrafts.
